How did we get here?

- Western cultural influences:
 - modern and post-modern individualism
 - tri-partition of society (institutionally, socially, spatially)
- Developmental psychology and educational theory influence
- The success of parachurch organisations with teenagers in the 70's inspired churches to adopt similar specialised ministry approaches
- Consumerism: "the funnest hour of the week!" a growth strategy
- Ease: it takes more time, energy, effort and creativity to do intergenerational ministry
- No space (or time) for kids!

How many generations are under your roof each Sunday?

- Many functional growing churches can have up to six generations gather under the same roof on one day
- The church is one of the few cross-generational communities in Western society today
- Many churches like societies are segregated institutionally, socially, spatially
- The church has a unique claim to intergenerationalism, but most have bowed to societal conventions and segregated their congregations <u>ignoring the biblical mandate to be</u> <u>the whole body of Christ!</u>

What if?

"The church is the last place in society where all five living generations are gathered together under the same roof every week. Isn't it a shame that these marvellous gifts are often segregated from each other? The moment the elder and child enter most churches they are whisked away to different rooms.

What does the elder have to give? Time. Experience. Wisdom. Love. Perspective. Patience.

What does the child have to give? Wonder. Energy. Innocence. Honesty. Curiosity. Joy.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if our church had a time and place set aside to let the elder, the child, the parent, the teen and everyone in between share and celebrate the faith together? Wouldn't it be radical if we chose to be counter-cultural and kept the generations together for an hour or two each week? What if we could return to our roots and become once again be a counter-cultural movement? Rich Melheim, Faith Inkubators

Cross Multi Inter

- Many generations under one roof but are separated for worship, learning, play, mission etc.
- All generations are considered but "never the twain shall meet!"
- Some generations may be deemed to be superior to others.
- No desire to be transformed by each other (or belief that that is possible).

- Generations worship alongside each other for some time. Effort is made to "accommodate" all ages until they separate for their own worship and learning.
 - Generations don't get to know or appreciate each other, but rather tolerate each other.
- People may celebrate each other's presence but their interactions are generally superficial and polite.

- Some are "more equal (powerful) than others!"
- Relationships across the generations are prioritised and fostered.
- All ages worship together, learn together, pray together, serve together and play together.
- "Intergenerational" is a way of being. It is integral to their culture. It is who they are.
- INTERGENERATIONAL is INTENTIONAL!



Intergenerational: Doing things differently NOT doing different things

- 1. Create intergenerational experiences
- 2. Infuse intergenerational experiences and relationships into existing ministries and programmes
- 3. Connect (collide) generations intentionally

What do people think about change?

- Most people (churches) change just enough to get away from their problems, not enough to solve them.
- Most people (churches) want to change their circumstances to improve their lives instead of changing themselves to improve their circumstances.

What do people think about change?

 Most people (churches) do the same thing the same way and expect different results.

 Most people (churches) are willing to change not because they see the light but because they feel the heat.

Three Key Factors for Change



Dissatisfaction – provides momentum



Vision (a snapshot/dream of the desired future) – provides direction, clarifies purpose for change



Passion – provides energy and builds a positive climate for designing a new way of being
